For we know that if the earthly tent we live in is destroyed, we have a building from God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens.

Musical Notes:

Today's Old Testament Lesson deals with the Expulsion from Eden, and today's pieces deal with this subject matter. In 1844, the English publishers Coventry and Hollier commissioned Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy (1809–1847) to write "a set of voluntaries", which were to be published a year later. These six works, which Mendelssohn would term "sonatas", often reference Lutheran chorales.

The third sonata, however, has an earlier origination. At least the opening and closing processional portions of the first movement were composed for the wedding of his sister Fanny Mendelssohn (1805–1847), who was a composer in her own right, to the painter Wilhelm Hensel (1794–1861) on the third of October 1829. Felix was unable to play the piece himself after he was hit by a horse-drawn vehicle on September twenty-fifth, wherein he seriously injured his leg. The original score is lost, with the only known sketches of the opening and closing "processional portions" of the first movement being housed in the Bodleian Library.

The prelude for today is the "Con moto maestoso" from this Sonata, which includes the chorale "Aus tiefer Noth schrei ich zu dir". The chorale itself was composed by Martin Luther somewhere around 1523 and 1524 and was the first hymn where Luther wrote both the poem and melody. Based upon Psalm 130, "De Profundis" (which is the Psalm for this morning), he termed it "a psalm of redemption". The Phrygian mode found in this chorale and the "serious nature" of its subject matter (which Mendelssohn expounds upon in using a brilliant double fugue) is in sharp contrast to the joyance of the homophonic processional beginning and conclusion.

The apposition of "joyance" and "profundus" is again challenged by the sonata's second and concluding movement (which will be the Offertory for today). This curiously intimate and petite postscript exhibits Mendelssohn's famed melodic genius as heard in vocal solos such as "O rest in the Lord" from "Elijah". Defying the listener's expectation for a grand conclusion to this sonata, this movement draws the work to a lyrical, *dolce finis*. This conjoinment of "joyance", "profundus", and "intimacy"—all of which are grounded in theological notions of truth—expresses the Romantic vision of reality and the human experience within that framework.

The postlude, "Clameurs et choral," is taken from "L'Orgue Mystique" by the French organist Charles Tournemire (1870–1939). A musical depiction of the creation of the world, the text is taken from the Tract for Septuagesima: "Out of the deep have I called unto thee, O Lord: Lord, hear my voice. O let thine ears consider well the voice of my complaint. If thou, Lord, wilt be extreme to mark what is done amiss: O Lord, who may abide it? For there is mercy with thee: therefore shalt thou be feared" (Psalm 130) and the Office Hymn "Lucis Creator optime." This Office Hymn (attributed to Gregory the Great) deals with the Biblical etiological rendering of the creation of the world and humanity's thralldom to concupiscence and its desire for Redemption: "O blest Creator of the light, Who mak'st the day with radiance bright, And o'er the forming world didst call The light from chaos first of all; Whose wisdom joined in meet array The morn and eve, and named them Day: Night comes with all its darkling fears; Regard thy people's prayers and tears. Lest, sunk in sin, and whelmed with strife, They lose the gift of endless life; While thinking but the thoughts of time, They weave new chains of woe and crime. But grant them grace that they may strain The heavenly gate and prize to gain: Each harmful lure aside to cast, And purge away each error past. O Father, that we

ask be done, Through Jesus Christ, thine only Son; Who, with the Holy Ghost and thee, Doth live and reign eternally. Amen."

Readings for the Year of the Bible

This week's readings include the highlights from Ezekiel: Gog and Magog, the Valley of Dry Bones, and the river of living water flowing from the Temple and watering the earth. The present time may be dark for the exiles, but their future is bright. The book of Daniel is about a man who grew up as an exile in Babylon from boyhood, and whose life as a faithful Jew in a foreign land serves as a source of inspiration and courage. Interestingly, part of the book is in Hebrew and part is in Aramaic, the only Biblical book where that occurs.

Sunday, June 9: Ezekiel 36-38 (Day 248): The text repeats the movement from Israel's shameful past to a promised hopeful future; we are also introduced to "Gog, of the land of Magog," a symbolic representation of all the kings of the earth, along with the Valley of Dry Bones.

Monday, June 10: Ezekiel 39-40 (Day 249): Ezekiel's prophecy against Gog culminates in the king's total defeat. The final section of the book begins with Chapter 40's description of a restored Temple area.

Tuesday, June 11: Ezekiel 41-43 (Day 250): After a blueprint for the new Temple is given, Ezekiel sees the glory of God return and God promises to "live among the Israelites forever" there.

Wednesday, June 12: Ezekiel 44-46 (Day 251): These chapters weave together chastising reminders of the Hebrews' history with regulations for activities at the new Temple.

Thursday, June 13: Ezekiel 47-48 (Day 252): Ezekiel's temple tour concludes at the entrance of the temple proper, where he finds a stream of water coming from beneath the temple and flowing east, fresh water bringing life. Friday, June 14: Daniel 1-3 (Day 253): Daniel, taken captive to Babylon in 606 BC as a young boy, moves up the royal ranks and becomes an interpreter of dreams. Remaining faithful to Yahweh lands Daniel's friends in a fiery furnace.

Saturday, June 15: Daniel 4-5 (Day 254): The royal court sees the literal writing on the wall - MENE, MENE, TEKEL, PARSIN - and it's bad news for Nebuchadnezzar.
